NOTE:

- 1. Students will be advised in individual consultation to take a number of supporting courses in cognate disciplines. The program in cognates may emphasize either the social sciences or the natural sciences, reflecting the student's primary interest in biological anthropology, cultural anthropology, archaeology, or linguistics. Cognate courses may count toward the required four subfield electives with consent of the program coordinator or the department advisor.
- 2. All anthropology majors are encouraged to take SOC 275 (Social Statistics) as part of their undergraduate curriculum.
- 3. No Sociology courses may be counted toward the 37 hours in Anthropology required for the major.
- 4. Special topics courses which vary from semester to semester (ANT 306; 383) may be used to substitute for one of the four required subfield electives if consent is granted by the program coordinator.
- 5. A grade of C or better is required in ANT 102 and 185.

Admission to Anthropology programs is limited and is based on space availability and the competitiveness of the applicant pool. The Anthropology program at Illinois State University offers two sequences: Anthropology Sequence, and Anthropology Accelerated Sequence which is a pathway to the Anthropology Master's program.

ANTHROPOLOGY SEQUENCE

- Minimum of 40 hours in Anthropology required.
- Required courses (25 hours): ANT 102, 185, 274, 277, 281, 292, 350, 380, 382.
- Grade of C or better required in ANT 102 and 185.
- 15 hours of elective courses selected from ANT 270, 272, 273, 278, 280, 291, 294, 301, 302, 303, 306, 307, 308, 338, 342, 351, 370, 371, 372, 373, 374, 375, 376, 378, 379, 381, 383, 384, 385, 386, 387, 388, 392, 393, 398.
- At least 12 of 15 hours of elective courses must be at the 300-level.

- The following anthropology courses may be taken by anthropology majors to fulfill General Education requirements but do not count towards electives for the major:
 ANT 143, 176, 297.
- 2. All anthropology majors are encouraged to take SOC 275 (Social Statistics) as part of their undergraduate curriculum, however no Sociology courses may be counted toward the 40 hours in Anthropology required for the major.
- 3. Special topics courses (ANT 306; 383) vary from semester to semester may be taken twice for credit if the content is different.

Provide a description and list of proposed program revisions.

The proposed changes are to:

1. Specify the requirements for Anthropology sequence in preparation for the addition of a new, accelerated sequence.

- 2. Allow students to choose major elective courses without regard to subfield.
- 3. Add three (3) additional elective hours to the anthropology major, from 37 hours to 40 hours
- 4.Add newly proposed elective courses ANT 351, 379 (previously offered as "Selected Topics" courses);
- 5. Add existing courses, Undergraduate Teaching Assistantship (ANT 291) and Professional Practice internships (ANT 398) to our list of electives.
- 6. Add a note that ANT 297, a newly reinstated anthropology course, is available to anthropology majors as a General Education course but not for major elective credit.

In addition, we have modified some of the wording in the notes to clarify program requirements.

4. Provide a rationale for proposed program revisions.

These changes are proposed to provide greater flexibility for our undergraduate anthropology students.

- 1. The pending approval of a 4+1 Accelerated MA program in anthropology necessitates a few changes to the undergraduate program. In consultation with Amy Hurd and the Graduate School, we propose to divide the Major into two sequences, an Anthropology sequence and an accelerated (4+1 sequence). The changes herein pertain to the already established Major in Anthropology which will now be the Anthropology Sequence
- 2. Our curriculum was designed along a "four-field approach" (that is, students take courses in biological anthropology, cultural anthropology, linguistics, and archaeology) with roots in earliest days of anthropology. Anthropology has since become more specialized and this generalist approach in increasingly antiquated. Few undergraduate programs offer courses in all four subfields, and graduate programs in anthropology no longer require courses in all four subfields for admission. The four-field requirement is also out-of-line with students' interests which usually encompass one or two of the four subfields (we find that students tend either toward cultural/linguistic studies or toward biological and archaeological studies). The proposed changes to the required courses maintain exposure to the four sub-fields via the two introductory courses (ANT 102 and 185) and four courses in each of the subfields (ANT 274, 277, 281 and 350). However, we are allowing students to choose their subfield of focus by removing the requirement that electives come from each of the fields. We hope that this increased flexibility in the program attracts more students to our major.
- 3. While we are "opening up" elective choices for students, we also want to ensure that students still take a variety of courses in more than one subfield. We also want to ensure that our elective courses, especially at the upper-level, have robust enrollment numbers. Thus we propose to add three additional hours of elective courses to the major. Given that our major currently requires few hours (37 hours), which is less than similar majors, such as Geography, we do not anticipate that the addition will impact time to graduation or pose other impediments.
- 5. We wish to add newly proposed courses, ANT 351 and 379, to our curriculum as electives. These elective courses have already shown success as Selected Topics courses and reflect the disciplinary specialties of their instructors. In addition, we want to encourage students to take advantage of teaching and internship opportunities and thus propose to add these existing courses to courses eligible for elective credit.
- 6. ANT 297 is a newly reinstated anthropology course in the General Education Social Science category. Anthropology students may take this course but it will not count towards their major electives (as is the case with ANT 143 and ANT 176).
- 4.1. Provide a sample four year plan of study demonstrating that a student could realistically complete the program requirements in a specific number of semesters.

We do not expect that this change to our program will impact other programs on campus.

This proposal includes two new course proposals: ANT 351 (Midwestern Archaeology) and ANT 379 (Symbols in American Culture), which are grad/undergrad elective courses.

Explain why specific general education courses are required.

ANT 102 and ANT 185 serve as both General Education courses and as required introductory courses in the major (there is no change in this requirement). Most students do not have anthropology in high school and only learn of it via General Education courses. These courses provide a baseline education and serve as prerequisites for the required 200-level majors-only courses. Students must earn a C or better in ANT 102/185 courses in order to proceed in the major.

ANT 143, 176, and 297 are anthropology courses that may be taken by anthropology majors to fulfill their General Education requirements but are NOT stipulated as part of the major. These courses serve the General Education Program and are not prerequisites for any anthropology course.

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Comments

Comments from Version 1 from Todd Stewart (College Curriculum Committee Chair):

Hi. We voted to reject this proposal yesterday, because some fairly extensive changes are needed before we can approve it. Generally, please proofread the next version carefully; there are various scattered typos, etc. And, as in another proposal, you seem to use "sub-field" and "sub-discipline" interchangeably. We think it would improve clarity to pick one and use it consistently. More substantively: (1) ANT 291 and 398 are listed in a list of gen eds in the new catalog copy, but these are not gen ed courses. So this bit needs work. (2) We're not sure from the new copy whether ANT 143, 176, 197, 291, and 398 can count towards the ANT major as electives or not. Maybe this little list is meant to signal that these are the courses where gen ed and major double-dipping are allowed? We weren't sure. If they are possible electives for the major, then they should be added to the list of elective courses above. Partly, we're not sure how the electives and gen ed (but really not as noted in (1)) lists are interactions. (3) We also think that ANT 379 needs to be associated with this proposal. We would also not be able to approve the proposal without first approving ANT 197. So it might be a good idea to associate ANT 197 with this proposal as well. Thanks, Todd Stewart, Chair, CAS CC
