BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF THE PROPOSED PROGRAM

A Master's of Science in Family and Consumer Sciences currently exists with a concentration in Child Life. This application proposes four new sequences: (1) Human Development and Family Science, (2) Fashion Design and Merchandising, (3) Interior Design, and (4) Child Life. The new sequences will include a 2 course core of FCS 445 Statistics in Applied Science and Technology and FCS 497 Introduction to Research Methodology. The remaining hours will be split between FCS electives focused on the specialization area within the sequence with potential for electives outside of the department, depending on student interest and goals. All sequences will have a thesis and non-thesis option.

The rationale for these new sequences is to provide distinction for students studying specialized areas within the discipline of Family and Consumer Science. Currently, we are unable to market the specialized department because there are no sequences. A sequence for each area will be more appealing to students interested in a Master's degree for a specific area and make graduates more competitive for jobs in their respective subfields within Family and Consumer Sciences.

Currently the MS in Family and Consumer Sciences enrolls 6 Child Life students each fall for a total of 12 students. This enrollment is not expected to change. There are also approximately 2-3 students enrolled in each of the other three areas each year (6-9 students plus 12 child life = approximately 20 students). We expect this enrollment to increase to 5-6 students per sequence over the next few years. This will result in approximately 18 students total for each of those three sequences. Combined the total enrollment is expected to be 30 students (18 students plus 12 child life) with growth expected only in three sequences, approximately 10 additional students over the next five years.

Because the enrollment of students is expected to only slightly increase, the current operating budget is adequate. Course enrollment will only increase by 2-3 students per class (each sequence has specific courses related to their area) so no additional sections of courses will be needed, hence no additional faculty will be needed.
