Illinois State University's values are at the core of this minor as students will prepare to participate in social change as well as develop an awareness of personal social responsibility. This minor is intended to prepare students to engage actively in their citizenship. The interdisciplinary minor is open to all students of any ideological viewpoint and can be positively matched with any major as a way to broaden the student's learning experience and career perspectives. A civically educated individual 1) gains a sense of self-awareness as a citizen, 2) actively participates in community service, 3) develops an appreciation of diversity, 4) comprehends the interdependence within communities, societies, and the world, 5) grows an understanding of the democratic process, 6) displays critical thinking within the arena of democratic conversations and social issues, 7) becomes effective at problem-solving and change, and 8) is able to personally integrate reflection on service, social issues, and course content. ## Description of proposed program:

In teaching civic engagement at Illinois State University, we strive to develop civically responsible individuals who embrace their membership in communities and society by owning social issues and working to be a part of the solution, which requires ethical and civic judgments and interventions when appropriate. Illinois State University's values are at the core of this minor as students will prepare to participate in social change as well as develop an awareness of personal social responsibility. This minor is intended to prepare students to actively engage in their citizenship. The interdisciplinary minor is open to all students of any ideological viewpoint and can be positively matched with any major as a way to broaden the student's learning experience and career perspectives. There are three core courses (IDS125, IDS398.02, & POL101) leaving four electives comprised of courses from across disciplines. IDS125 Foundations of Citizenship: An Introduction to Civic Responsibility (course syllabus is attached) is a new gateway course that will provide a broad overview and understanding of civic engagement. IDS398.02 Professional Practice: The Service Learning Experience in Civic Engagement (course syllabus is attached) is a new professional practice course which is a culmination of the minor as the student engages in some aspect of service learning in the community. POL101 Citizenship and Governance (syllabi are attached) is an existing course that prepares students for their roles as citizens within the structure of our society. A civically educated individual 1) gains a sense of self-awareness as a citizen, 2) actively participates in community service, 3) develops an appreciation of diversity, 4) comprehends the interdependence within communities, societies, and the world, 5) grows an understanding of the democratic process, 6) displays critical thinking within the arena of democratic conversations and social issues, 7) becomes effective at problem-solving and change, and 8) is able to personally integrate reflection on service, social issues, and course content. This minor will provide students with opportunities to sharpen critical analysis, skill development, and personal reflection as well as substantive opportunities to study and perform civic engagement in their communities.

#### Rationale for proposal:

The rationale for implementation of this Minor includes:

- The values and learning outcomes are consistent with Illinois State University's values. A core value of Educating Illinois states, "Illinois State University prepares students to be informed and engaged citizens who will promote and further the collective goals of society. The University promotes active learning experiences through which students will gain an awareness and understanding of civic engagement as a lifelong responsibility. Furthermore, the University encourages faculty and staff to serve as engaged civic leaders and role models promoting the quality of life for all citizens through collaborative and individual action."
- Research indicates that students are seeking opportunities for civic engagement and learning about civic responsibility.

- Research indicates that institutions of higher education are underprepared to meet the learning needs of students in this area.
- Research indicates that employers across career sectors are seeking students with heightened civic awareness and experience.
- This minor will help to centralize various civic engagement components across campus such as the American Democracy Project and other service learning projects.
- Review of similar minors at peer institutions indicates usefulness in accreditation process.
- Implementation of this minor and its service learning component will continue to enhance community partnerships and relationships as well as develop new ones.
- A multi-disciplinary minor further unites the University towards achieving our student-centered values.
- This minor in unison with their majors, will further prepare students for their careers and lives as active and responsible citizens within their communities. "Civic responsibility means active participation in the public life of a community in an informed, committed, and constructive manner, with a focus on the common good." If students leave ISU illequipped or unprepared for their roles as engaged citizens, our institution has failed the students as well as ourselves.

### **Expected impact of proposal on existing campus programs:**

At this point, the Minor should not create a negative drain on academic units' resources. Commitment of "seats' and participation from academic units is voluntary. We see the impact on existing campus programs as positive in that the Minor is generating new resources that will be funneled back the academic units through 1) course reinvention stipends, 2) course enhancement grants, 3) student scholarships, 4) instructor training scholarship through Community Engaged Classrooms and CTLT, and 5) opportunities and course buy-outs for faculty to teach the Foundations course (IDS125) on a rotating basis.

#### Expected curricular changes including new courses:

There are only two new courses proposed for this minor. The goal of this minor is two programmatically compliment students' existing major areas of study as well as heighten their civic engagement competencies. The design and implementation of the minor should not negatively influence students' matriculation.

## Milner contacted to determine sufficient resources:

## **Anticipated staff arrangements:**

The minor will require one Advisor responsible for 1) recruitment and advising of students, 2) curriculum coordination, 3) training instructors to teach Foundations course IDS125), 4) coordination and supervision of capstone service learning course (IDS398.02), 5) promoting the Minor across all disciplines, 6) supervising student intern when available, and 7) working with CTLT on training and awarding of grants and stipends.

## Anticipated funding needs and source of funds:

Funding for the development, implementation, and support of the Minor comes from a \$140,000 State Farm grant specifically for this purpose. (Financial Impact Form is attached)

# Budget narrative listing projected sources of program funding (including sources of reallocated funds).

The Minor in Civic Engagement and Social Leadership will be offered for the first time in the Fall of 2010. The new course will be offered one time per year (.125 FTE per year). The coordination of the minor, including internship/capstone experiences will be funded by one course release for a faculty member per academic year (.125 FTE per year). Thus, the .25 FTE covers both the release time for coordination and the teaching of a new course.

State Farm Foundation is funding the Year 1 and Year 2 costs of staffing the course and the release time for coordinating the internship/capstone experience. Thus the first two years of the minor's existence as a program for undergraduate students will cost Illinois State nothing. The personnel costs begin to take effect in Year 3 and are calculated with 3% increases each year thereafter. We also plan to ask State Farm for additional funding for Year 3.

The support services are for the teacher of the new course and coordinator of the minor to advance the program. This includes all standard operating costs associated with a program (e.g., copying, phone, marketing, etc).
